



The new Graduate Support Director at Seattle Nativity School, Artice Jackson, reflects on her Nativity experience and how it has impacted her life. Before attending St. Andrew Nativity School, Artice was terrified of public speaking and suffered from low self- esteem. During her time at Nativity she was able to overcome these obstacles by participating in the Promoting Success Luncheon, Mass, and presenting class projects. "I was able to face my fears and gain a sense of confidence that I began to apply to all areas of my life both socially and academically." Artice has come full circle and is now a resource to other Nativity alumni as they continue their journey to success.

Most new students at Nativity are nervous about the rigors of the school, but not Gabriela Rubio. "I was so excited to be the second person in my family to attend Nativity. Roberto, my older brother, graduated class of '04," she said. Gabriela values the relationships she built at Nativity and credits her Jesuit education and former teachers for molding her into the socially conscious woman she is today. Gabriela works as a Youth Program Coordinator for Mano a Mano, an organization dedicated to helping youth in the criminal justice system avoid recidivism. "I feel like I am giving back to the community and world in my current occupation and see a connection between the work I do, and the work Nativity does."

This year's Promoting Success Luncheon speaker, Danielle West, shared the importance of a great education and how Nativity School has impacted her both academically and personally. Danielle recalls her time at Nativity as a season of growth stating that those adolescent years were essential to her future success. "Even though I did not know it at the time, my years at Nativity were a jump start to my future." Danielle is currently impacting her community as the Program Coordinator for Our House, an organization that helps those living with HIV. Danielle will continue to help those in need as she pursues her Master's in Social Work.

Leading up to the event, each of the chefs invite a group of Nativity students to tour their restaurants and sample the cooking demos to be served at the dinner. Eigth grader Eden recalls, "It was really fun! The food was delicious, and I tried some new foods I have never eaten."

Harvesting Success also gives attendees the chance to bid on a painting by a local artist. This year, Joanne Kollman will paint a scene inspired by her time with the students. She recently volunteered to teach an art class as part of the summer school program.

Through their talents and gifts, this generous community of Nativity supporters are uplifting the education of our students for a brighter future.



Sonya Strickland, Nativity School's counselor, grew up in the Eugene area with her mom, eventually moving to Portland for college. She received her Bachelor of Science in 1994, majoring in Sociology with a minor in Urban Studies & Planning at Portland State University. She received her Master of Social Work in 1998 and became a Licensed Clinical Social Worker (LCSW) in 2005.

Before finding her home at Nativity, Sonya worked a range of positions from being a Child Protective Services (CPS) Caseworker for the Department of Human Services to a therapist for Lifeworks Northwest. She started working as the school counselor at Nativity in 2007. Sonya does one-on-one counseling with students and works with families and teachers to meet each child's needs academically and emotionally.

In the summer, Sonya conducts home site visits to better inform the faculty about a student's home life. Students have the opportunity to sign up for counseling groups during afterschool enrichment. Boys to Responsible Men is co-facilitated by Sgt. George Weatheroy and runs throughout the year. Girls groups vary but include GIRLS (Girls in Real Life Situations), a loss and grief group, and a self-esteem group for girls who aren't close with their father. She also hosts Rhoni's Girls, a class in memory of Rhoni Wiswall.

When asked why Sonya loves Nativity School, she replied, "I love everything about working at Nativity—I love my co-workers, I love the kids, I love how small we are so that we can form really strong relationships with our students and their families."

Sonya is married to Patrick who works for CPS and coaches Jefferson High School's basketball team. She has one son who is 21, and Patrick has three children 22, 21, and 18. Sonya and Pat were recently blessed with twin grandsons. Sonya loves scrapbooking, lifting weights, and spending time in nature.


